Isaiah Series, Part 7: The Suffering Servant (Isaiah 52:13-53:12)

Main Idea: In part 7 of our series in Isaiah we look at the most amazing aspect of the work that the coming Servant of the Lord will accomplish on behalf of God's people—forgiveness through suffering.

- 2. He bore our sorrows and sins (v4-6)
- 3. He died innocent (v7-9)
- 4. He lives victorious (v10-12)

Key Text/Quotes:

"All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned—every one—to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all." Isaiah 53:6

"He made him to be sin who knew no sin so that in Him we might become the righteousness of God." 2 Corinthians 5:21

"When he was reviled, he did not revile in return; when he suffered, he did not threaten, but continued entrusting himself to him who judges justly." 1 Peter 2:23

Fellowship Starters:

- 1. Read Isaiah 52:13-53:12 and open in prayer.
- 2. Having read through the text, take some time to review and discuss how Kevin came up with his 4 sub-points. How might you title each section?
- 3. One of the most important theological terms that has been used to describe Isaiah 53:4-6 is is the term "substitution." What does it mean and what is its significance for us as Christians?
- 4. In 2 Corinthians 5:21 (see above) Paul was certainly thinking of Isaiah 53:4-6. Similarly, Peter in 1 Peter 2:23 also reminds us of Isaiah's portrait of Jesus' substitutionary death on our behalf (compare it to Isaiah 53:7). Discuss how Peter calls us to respond to Jesus' substitutionary sacrifice as motivation for how we are to now live in 1 Peter 2:18-25.
